Estimates for the Seamless Summer Option waiver are based on national average free, reduced price and paid percentages applied to July 2018 through June 2019 meal counts to estimate reimbursement levels prior to the Seamless Summer Option waiver compared the same meal counts multiplied by the free NSLP and SBP reimbursement rates to estimate the increase due to offering all meals free through the Seamless Summer Option waiver. Estimates for the Summer Food Service Program rates waiver are based on July 2018 through June 2019 meal counts and multiplying the Summer Food Service Program rates effective as of January 2021 compared the same meal counts multiplied by the free NSLP/SBP reimbursement rates to estimate the increase due to the Summer Food Service Program waiver. DOD Army/Air Force, Marines, and Navy estimated to receive about \$5 million.
