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Summary:	(1) This document is a template to assist States in the development of an amendment to extend their approved State plan to operate Pandemic EBT for school children and for children in child care during summer 2021. (2) This document relates to Section 1106 of the Families First Coronavirus Response Act (P.L. 116-127) as amended by the Continuing Appropriations Act, 2021 and Other Extensions Act (P.L. 116-159), the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), and the American Rescue Plan Act, 2021 (P.L. 117-2)

The submission of a P-EBT state plan, associated template and related reporting obligations are addressed in OMB# 0584-0660. This emergency information collection (IC) will be replaced by a full IC package to be submitted to OMB for approval prior to its expiration date of 8/31/21. All components of this summer 2021 P-EBT package will be addressed in the full IC package.

Amendment to Approved State Plan for Pandemic EBT Children in School and/or Child Care, Summer 2021

- 1. State: Iowa-Summer Pandemic EBT
- **2. Primary Citation**: Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA) as amended by the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021
- 3. Here's what FNS needs from you:
 - **a.** If a State chooses to elect the U.S. standard benefit¹, simply check the box below. Next, go to letter 'c' (*Estimated total amount of P-EBT benefits*) of the template.
 - By checking this box, we are indicating that our State will use the U.S. standard benefit for the covered summer period.
 - **b.** If a State chooses not to elect the U.S. standard benefit, FNS needs the following information:
 - The number of days for which benefits will be issued as part of the State's covered summer period; and
 - An explanation for how the State arrived at the number of days in the State's covered summer period. USDA will not approve a plan that does not tie the length of its covered summer period to the actual summer 2021 calendars of an enrollment-weighted average, or the median, of a representative sample of its school districts.

Response: Iowa elects to use the U.S. standard benefit amount of \$375.00.

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¹ The U.S. standard benefit – as defined in Question #5 of FNS' Q&A document titled, "Summer P-EBT Q&A" – is equal to the median number of weekdays in the sampled school districts multiplied by the daily P-EBT rate. For States in the continental U.S., that works out to a fixed summer benefit of \$375 per eligible child (55 days at \$6.82 per day). The U.S. standard benefit is higher for Alaska, Hawaii, and the territories; see Q/A #14 for a complete set of standard benefit amounts.

- **c.** Estimated total amount of P-EBT benefits the State will issue within this amendment's date range. (Consult the appropriate table in Section 4, "Benefit Levels.")

For school-aged children:

- Describe how the State will identify school children who received P-EBT benefits during the last month of SY 20-21.
- Describe how the State will identify school children who were eligible for free or reduced price school meals under the NSLP and SBP in SY 20-21 but did not receive P-EBT benefits in the last month of the school year because they attended school in-person and benefitted from a free or reduced price meal service at school. This includes children who were eligible for F/RP meals during the school year and did not receive P-EBT benefits because the children attended school inperson during the school year.

• Describe how the State will identify children who are determined newly eligible for free or reduced price school meals during the covered summer period. States must provide an opportunity for families to apply for free or reduced price meals using the normal application process. States and SFAs should consider maintaining a minimum presence to process Free and Reduced Price Meal applications, perhaps on a part-time or weekly basis. Another alternative is for SFAs to accept new Free and Reduced Price Meal applications during the summer but only process them after the start of the new school year. Children determined eligible on applications *submitted prior to the end of the summer* could then be issued P-EBT benefits retroactively after the start of the new school year. (Note that it is preferable to process applications and issue benefits during the summer period that the benefits are intended to cover).

For children in child care:

- Describe how the State will identify SNAP-enrolled children who received P-EBT child care benefits in the last month of the school year.
- Describe how the State will identify SNAP-enrolled children who would have received P-EBT child care benefits in the last month of the school year, but did not receive benefits because their child care facility was not closed or operating at reduced attendance or hours in that month, and neither their child care facility nor the child's residence was in the area of a school that was closed or operating at reduced attendance or hours in that month.
- Describe how the State will identify children who are part of a SNAP household who are newly eligible for P-EBT child care benefits during the covered summer period

Response:

Summer P-EBT for school-aged children:

As outlined in the 2020-2021 school year P-EBT plan approved for Iowa, the Iowa Department of Education (DOE) will provide DHS with a list of students who were eligible for school P-EBT in May of 2021 (May will be used as the last month of the school year for summer P-EBT purposes). DOE will also provide DHS with a list of all children who were eligible for NSLP in 05/2021 but did not have any eligible days for P-EBT because they attended school in-person. DHS will use the two lists and de-duplicate the names to avoid duplication of benefits.

DOE will notify DHS of any children who are newly eligible for NSLP during the summer benefit period. Any applications received during the covered summer period that cannot be processed during the summer due to staff shortages, building being closed, etc. will be processed when school staff return to the building and the payments will be made retroactively for any children newly eligible for NSLP. Only applications received during the summer period ending 08/13/2021 will be used to determine summer P-EBT eligibility. Iowa will consider children eligible for NSLP when they completed an application for the school year 2020- 2021 and for

school year 2021-2022, as long as the application was completed and submitted prior to the 08/13/2021 cutoff date. Iowa has decided to use 08/13/2021 as the end of the summer period because that date is 10 days before 08/23/2021, which is the earliest date schools can begin their school year per Iowa Code. Iowa intends to issue summer P-EBT benefits from September 11th-20th for school children who were determined newly eligible, based on an application for NSLP turned in over the summer and by 08/13/2021. Applications received after the end of the 2020-2021 school year cannot be used to provide retroactive school P-EBT benefits for the 2020-2021 school year. Children who will begin kindergarten in the 2021-2022 school year are not eligible for summer P-EBT for school children, but they may be eligible based on the child care summer P-EBT guidelines.

Summer P-EBT for child care children:

Iowa DHS will get data from Iowa's state eligibility system to identify children under the age of six who received SNAP benefits in May 2021 (May 2021 will be used as the last month of the school year for summer P-EBT purposes). Iowa will determine children under the age of six who were eligible for child care P-EBT in the month of May 2021 based on Iowa's approved child care P-EBT plan and that continued to receive SNAP benefits during the covered summer period. We will use the list of students determined eligible for school P-EBT and de-duplicate that list from the list of children under six receiving SNAP benefits to ensure there is no duplication of benefits. Iowa will not disqualify children from summer P-EBT who turn 6 during the covered summer period. Children who become eligible or ineligible for SNAP during the covered summer period will receive the full summer P-EBT benefit amount of \$375.00. Children under the age of 6 who become newly eligible for summer P-EBT effective during the covered summer period, which ends 08/13/2021, will receive their summer P-EBT benefits between September 11th-20th.

^{1.} Lunch rates include the 7 cent performance-based reimbursement and the extra 2 cents per meal received by school food authorities in which 60 percent or more of the lunches served during the second preceding school year were served free or at a reduced price.

^{2.} Breakfast rates are those received by "severe need" schools.

^{3.} Snack rates are those for afterschool snacks served in afterschool care programs

Civil Rights Statement

The State will continue to comply with civil rights requirements, to include providing equal access to individuals with disabilities and individuals who are limited English proficient.

Administration of State P-EBT Plan

The State will administer P-EBT according to the terms of its approved State plan. In general, conditions related to benefit issuance reporting, administrative funding, and release of information remain in effect for the covered summer period. If the State wishes to change any of the terms of its plan, the State shall first notify USDA and will, if requested by USDA, submit a plan amendment for USDA review and approval.

For Summer P-EBT, we have contracted with a call center to be the point of contact for incoming P-EBT calls. They will accept calls Monday-Friday from 8:00 AM-5:00 PM and their phone number is 833-631-2508. This P-EBT call center, in conjunction with DHS, will notify DOE if there is a question regarding school eligibility information and DOE will research the issue. DHS will continue to issue replacement P-EBT cards.

Reminder

If the State needs to make any significant changes to its Summer 2021 plan after approval, the State needs to submit an amendment to FNS that describes the change and its impact on operating summer P-EBT. USDA will review the amendment and approve allowable amendments.
