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Summary:	(1) This document is a template to assist States in the development of an amendment to extend their approved State plan to operate Pandemic EBT for school children and for children in childcare during summer 2021. (2) This document relates to Section 1106 of the Families First Coronavirus Response Act (P.L. 116-127) as amended by the Continuing Appropriations Act, 2021 and Other Extensions Act (P.L. 116-159), the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (P.L. 116-260), and the American Rescue Plan Act, 2021 (P.L. 117-2)

The submission of a P-EBT state plan, associated template and related reporting obligations are addressed in OMB# 0584-0660. This emergency information collection (IC) will be replaced by a full IC package to be submitted to OMB for approval prior to its expiration date of 8/31/21. All components of this summer 2021 P-EBT package will be addressed in the full IC package.

¹ The U.S. standard benefit – as defined in Question #5 of FNS' Q&A document titled, "Summer P-EBT Q&A" – is equal to the median number of weekdays in the sampled school districts multiplied by the daily P-EBT rate. For States in the continental U.S., that works out to a fixed summer benefit of \$375 per eligible child (55 days at \$6.82 per day). The U.S. standard benefit is higher for Alaska, Hawaii, and the territories; see Q/A #14 for a complete set of standard benefit amounts.

e. P-EBT issuance schedule

- a. P-EBT for school children already known to DHS and PDE via the Stage 3 data collection completed in July 2021 will be issued over 10 business days beginning September 13, 2021 and ending on September 24, 2021. The issuance will be for the full \$375 to cover the entire summer.
- b. P-EBT for school children who are newly eligible for the National School Lunch Program will be issued on October 8, 2021. As this population is anticipated to be less than 100,000 students, Pennsylvania does not anticipate the need to send multiple files over multiple days.
- c. P-EBT for childcare children will be issued in two issuances. The first issuance will be spread over two business days beginning September 27, 2021 and ending on September 28, 2021. The second issuance will be a cleanup issuance that will be issued on October 15 to capture any children missed in the initial issuance.

f. Identifying Eligible Children for School-Aged P-EBT

- a. Pennsylvania retains a list of all children submitted by the schools for P-EBT as a part of the 2020-2021 school year, which includes whether the student is in Free, Paid, or Reduced-Price meal status and what instructional model the student was in for each month from September through May. Pennsylvania will use this list to identify all children that received a benefit for May 2021 because they were listed as Free or Reduced and in a Virtual or Blended instructional model. These children will be issued Summer P-EBT.
- b. Pennsylvania will use the same input list referenced in sub-bullet point a. to identify all children listed as Free or Reduced that were still enrolled at some point in May 2021. These children will be issued Summer P-EBT.

- c. Schools will continue to take applications and determine eligibility for free and reduced-price meals during the summer months. Because the final data collection for the 2020-2021 school year is being collected on July 2, 2021, students who became eligible in June 2021 will already be identified. A new data collection of children who were enrolled during the 2020-2021 school year and became eligible for Free or Reduced-Price meals after the school submitted its final data collection file for the 2020-2021 school year P-EBT will be completed during the first three weeks of September with a submission due date of September 24, 2021. This list will then be cross-checked against the final submission for the school year to ensure any duplicate entries who were already eligible are identified and removed.
- d. Any benefits issued under sub-bullet point a. will be issued to the EBT or P-EBT card to which Stage 3 benefits were issued. Any benefits issued under sub-bullet point b. or c. will be issued to the EBT card, if the child is actively receiving SNAP or TANF and the school has provided enough information for DHS to confidently issue benefits to the EBT card or to a P-EBT card if the child is not active for SNAP or TANF or the school did not provide enough information to confidently match to a SNAP or TANF case.

g. Identifying Eligible Children for Childcare-Aged P-EBT

- a. Pennsylvania retains the list of eligible children pulled from its Data Warehouse for P-EBT. Pennsylvania will use this list to identify any eligible children, age 5 and younger, that were still an eligible member in a SNAP case during May 2021.
- b. Pennsylvania will use the same list referenced in sub-bullet point a. to identify children residing in a county that was classified as In-Person during May 2021 and ensure they are also issued Summer P-EBT benefits.
- c. In September, Pennsylvania will pull a new list of children, age 5 and younger, that were eligible for SNAP benefits during June, July, or August 2021. This list will be cross-checked against the list referenced in sub-bullet points a. and b. to remove duplicate entries to ensure each child receives only one P-EBT benefit for the summer.
- d. The final list of eligible childcare aged children will be cross checked against the final list of eligible school-aged children to ensure no duplication occurs between the two distinct age groups. If a child is on both lists, the child will receive benefits under the school-aged children procedures.
- e. A subsequent list of children, age 5 and younger, that were eligible for SNAP during August 2021 but who were authorized after the initial list was determined will be pulled in October.
- f. Any benefits issued to children eligible under the childcare P-EBT will be issued to the SNAP household's EBT card.
